

OBLR Supports Brownfields Revitalization Through:

a) Grants and technical assistance to promote:

- planning, assessment, clean up and reuse of brownfield sites
- environmental workforce development and job training

b) Liability protections to encourage acquisition and investment in brownfield reuse

c) Establishing and enhancing state and tribal response programs







Brownfields Assessments

Grant & technical assistance support for sites with known or potential contamination:

- Inventory: Compile a list of brownfields
- Characterization: Identify past uses
- Assessment: Determine existing contamination
- Area-Wide, Cleanup and Redevelopment Planning: Scope and plan process for site assessment, cleanup and reuse
- Community Involvement: Inform and engage stakeholders



Brownfields Cleanup

Grants provide funding to carry out cleanup activities at one or more brownfield site(s):

- Cleanup Grants cleanup planning and contaminant abatement at one or more sites owned by the recipient.
- Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grants –
 capitalize a RLF program to provide
 loans and subgrants for cleanups.



Environmental Workforce Development & Job Training (EWDJT)

- Grants provide funding to recruit, train, and place unemployed and under-employed residents of communities affected by solid and hazardous waste.
- Support training in programs across EPA: solid waste, Superfund, brownfields, emergency response, waste and stormwater, chemical safety, etc.



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE


Technical Assistance to Brownfields Communities (TAB Program)

- Provides geographically-based technical assistance and training to communities and other stakeholders on brownfield issues.
- Available to help guide communities through the cleanup and redevelopment process. TAB Grantees can offer:
 - help in preparing grant proposals,
 - performing site inventories,
 - reviewing historical information,
 - assisting with the design of the investigation/sampling/field analysis,
 - and cleanup and redevelopment planning


Land Revitalization

- Assistance for feasibility studies, market analyses, stakeholder engagement, including green & healthy practices into site cleanup, design and (de)construction, etc.
























Cumulative Program Accomplishments Since 1998 Through FY17

- Assessed >27,000 brownfield properties
- Cleaned up >1,600 properties
- Made >6,200 properties ready for reuse
- Made >70,000 acres ready for reuse
- Leveraged >129,000 jobs
- Leveraged >\$24.7 billion in public and private funds



BUILD ACT AMENDMENTS TO BROWNFIELDS LAW – GRANT PROGRAMS

- Expanded Eligibility for Nonprofit Organizations and limited liability corporations
 - Adds 501(c)(3) nonprofits as eligible to receive assessment and RLF grants
- Increased Funding for Cleanup Grants
 - Up to \$500k per site; waiver up to \$650k
- Established a Multi-Purpose Grant (§104(k)(4))
 - Up to \$1 M; no more than 15% of appropriation
 - New ranking criteria
- Removed Administrative Cost Prohibition
 - Recipients may use up to 5% of award on administrative costs

BUILD ACT AMENDMENTS TO BROWNFIELDS LAW – OWNERSHIP AND LIABILITY

- Amended §101(20)(D) by removing "involuntarily" and providing certainty to governmental entities that acquired ownership or control of a site by virtue of its function as sovereign.
- Amended § 101 (20) to provide relief for Alaska Native Villages and Native Corporations

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- Added liability exemption for certain publicly owned sites for grant eligibility
 - Can receive grant funds for sites acquired prior to January 11, 2002, so long as did not contribute/cause contamination.
- Revised § 101 (40) Bona Fide Prospective Purchaser definition to include tenancy or leasehold interests.
