




The Trump administration's proposal to more than double the Census Bureau's current budget next fiscal year sounds more impressive than what the increase will really mean for the agency, census experts warn.

Under President Donald Trump's spending proposal for fiscal 2019, the Census Bureau stands out as one of the few federal nondefense agencies that would receive an increase in funding — and by guite a lot. The budget proposal would increase the bureau's funding to \$3.8 billion, an increase of more than \$2.3 billion from current spending levels.
