Real Estate Development and Reuse



- Investors, developers and builders are losing some interest in the so-called 24-hour gateway cities -- San Francisco and New York City -- and have developed more interested in cities like Dallas and Portland, where there are more housing deals to be had.
- Some big cities, such as Detroit, have real estate available for extremely low prices, however, the land is very undesirable.
- In Detroit, the low price for housing does not make up for the relatively high cost of other living expenses such as transportation.

Main Streets/Downtown



- **Ways to promote downtown development**
 - Recurring public event
 - Create more space
 - Open underutilized public land for private development
 - Public market
 - Downtown satellite university campus
 - Build a streetcar
 - Amenities such as playgrounds to accommodate young families
 - Branded downtown entertainment district
 - Establish maximum parking standards

Workforce Development



- **Workforce programs for good-paying jobs in fast growing fields**
 - Nearly one million working New Yorkers—a quarter of the entire labor force—earn less than \$20,000 per year. At the same time, employers in fast-growing, high-paying fields are confronting a shortage of skilled workers. NYC has created several career pathway programs for growing industries, with partnerships that provide real-time feedback on employer needs. The recommendations came from a diverse range of stakeholders, including leadership from major employers, educational institutions, philanthropic organizations like New York Community Trust, the Central Labor Council and social service providers.

Tech-Led Economic Development



- **“It’s becoming clear that as we shift to a data-driven economy, tech innovation depends not just on engineering talent but on expertise in areas such as design, commerce, content creation, and user interface. These needs play to the strength of New York, and other big cities as well, that have a critical mass both of large companies and creative workers.”**
