
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# Production in the city is key to having a strong economy with strong neighborhoods

Hardware Prototyping – 1000-2000 sqft - technology focused, design onsite, production runs offsite



Makerspace – hobbyists, tinkerer, startups & training



Shared Kitchen/Shared Woodshop – small businesses share tools with select few
